Matthew's no stranger to helping others and uses his learned skills in first aid, radio communication, fire safety, and more by volunteering his support at a range of events.



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New Internship Programme for Young Adults with Learning Disabilities

A new life changing supported internship programme for young adults with learning disabilities and/or autism spectrum conditions, has just launched at Marriott London Twickenham.

West Thames College in partnership with Marriott London Twickenham and national charity DFN Project SEARCH, have formed a collaborative partnership to give young people with learning disabilities and/or autism vital work-based learning opportunities to help them to secure competitive employment.

The pioneering programme involves total workplace immersion at its very best, facilitating a seamless combination of classroom instruction, career exploration, and hands-on skills training.

This local programme comes after DFN Project SEARCH recently launched a new employability campaign #InclusionRevolution, which aims to support 10,000 young adults aged between 18 – 25 with a learning disability or autism into paid employment by 2030.

The initiative highlights the shocking reality that only 4.8% of people with learning disabilities in England secure paid employment, compared to 80% of their peers. That means an astonishing 95% will be forced to live a lifetime on benefits.

DFN Project SEARCH is a national transition to work programme for students with learning disabilities and/or autism spectrum conditions. They work in partnership across the public, private and voluntary sectors to create supported employment internships within private and public



settings. This is undertaken during their last year of education, helping them to make positive transitions from education to the world of work.

With the largest data set in the UK, DFN Project SEARCH's evidence-based model challenges misconceptions and changes the way society views and enables young adults with learning disabilities and autism to ensure that they reach their true and full potential.

DFN Project SEARCH is a businessled, one-year transition to employment programme for young people with a learning disability and autism or both.

DFN Project SEARCH believes that everyone deserves the right to aspire to the very best future, yet 4.8% of people with a learning disability who are known to local authorities in England go on to secure full-time paid employment. Its ambition is to ensure that everyone with a learning disability or autism can attain high-quality, integrated employment in their local area.

The programme has supported more than 1,600 young people into paid work and has the aim to support 10,000 interns into work by 2030, and 20,000 by 2035.

to be launching another DFN Project Search programme with our fantastic new partner – the Marriott London Twickenham. West Thames have been running Project Search supported internships for 11 years and we have seen first-hand the transformational impact this has had on the lives of so many young people. It's not just the interns that benefit from these programmes but it's also the hugely positive impact on the College and the host employer. Here at West Thames, we've had the privilege of employing an intern and what a great appointment this has been. We are really excited to be working in partnership with the Marriott on this new venture."

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Holocaust Memorial Day Trust Visit













On Thursday 19 January, the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust visited our Isleworth campus to share an informative, on-topic presentation, hosted in our very own Endeavour Theatre.

West Thames governors and over 100 students attended the event. The day itself is for everyone to remember the millions of people murdered in the Holocaust, under Nazi persecution, and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia, and Darfur.

The presentation started with a welcome speech by our Mayor Raghwinder Siddhu.

West Thames College wants to show appreciation to Gabriel Stein for sharing his family's stories and experiences during the Holocaust. Gabriel told the story of his mother, Marie Stein (née Mazur), and how she and her family survived the Holocaust in Poland. In 1939, when Marie was ten years old, she lost her childhood forever. Word War Two broke out, with Germany invading Poland, overpowering the country in less than a month. From then until their liberation she lived with the risk of getting beaten up, killed, or sent to a concentration camp. She remembers that each and every night, she feared that she might have said something that could have endangered the family and could cause them to be killed.

Gabriel shared this story in remembrance of his own family. He believes that Holocaust survivor narratives should be actively shared.

These experiences and contributions gave us a unique insight into the lives of those who have endured persecution.

for UK Police Forces and Heathrow Airport.

They impressed many people at Ajar and have bright futures ahead of them".

Maths Students Overcome the Odds


Maths students from West Thames College have beaten the odds to secure trophies at the Mathematic Education Innovation's (MEI) Further Education Maths Challenge. This competition is for post-16 students who are working towards gaining a Functional Skills maths qualification or improving their GCSE Mathematics grade.

The final of the competition held at Goldsmiths University is a culmination of many regional finals held in colleges and sports stadiums with 40+ teams represented from across the country.

The West Thames College team consisted of Ako Rostami, Erosha Araujo, Dmytro Horlov, Kateryna Bodnar, Stephanie Espinoza Sevilla and Thomas Hall. Despite having one of the smallest teams in the competition, our students managed to win the following trophies in two of the three categories available:

- 1st place in 'The Funkies' category which is for students whose highest GCSE grade is a grade 1.
- **3rd place** in the 'Ein2steins' category which is for students whose highest GCSE grade is a grade 2.


National Apprenticeships Week 2023

Further Education (FE) Colleges and Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) with campuses across the seven West London boroughs have worked with the West London Alliance and West London Business to develop a pioneering agreement to help students progress from courses in further education to higher-level study.


The agreement is designed to increase the number of people progressing into a higher level of study in important sectors of West London, helping the subregions economy grow - and local residents to benefit from and support that growth.

Focused on courses in some of the most significant growth sectors for West London's economy - Digital, the Creative & Cultural sectors, the Green Economy, and Health & Care - this multi-institution agreement builds on earlier local, bi-lateral agreements between individual institutions, often focusing on just one course. Taking a wider, multi-institutional, multi-course approach, this new progression agreement provides clear pathways for students across West London to a wide range of further study.

The agreement commits participating HEIs to offering places to students securing specific grades in a range of Level 3 qualifications at participating colleges on several 'matched' degree programmes provided students meet relevant admission requirements.

Tracy Aust, Principal of West Thames College and chair of the West London FE Principals Group said: "As colleges, we're committed to helping our students reach their full potential, including through supporting them in their next steps. By working closely with our higher education partners across West London on this progression agreement, we're delighted to be putting in place a mechanism that should make progressing from further to higher education - in courses really important to our boroughs' future labour market all the more seamless."





A collaborative project called 'The Good, The Evil...And the Misunderstood' showcased the skills of our HND Specialist Make-Up students and our Level 3 Performing Arts students. Our Performing Arts students were asked to create an original 'Fantasy Character' and devise not just a 'look' for this character, but also a detailed backstory. All Performing Arts students wrote a monologue and duologue, which they performed as their characters.

At the very beginning of the process. the Performing Arts students linked up with the Specialist Make-Up






